Halloween Costumes and Stereotype Biases

When considering purchasing or creating a Halloween costume for your child, we urge you to look critically at the various types of costumes that are marketed to children and the stereotypes and/or biases that some costumes may be promoting. This can be done by asking a couple of key questions and discussing with your child:

- Are there any ways in a which a Halloween costume might represent something hurtful or harmful to people's ideas or feelings?
- Why might it be important to carefully review and analyze Halloween costumes before purchasing or deciding to wear one?
- What type of costumes perpetuate racial, cultural, and/or gender stereotypes or reinforce limited and/or hurtful ways of thinking about people? (Pocahontas, Native Americans, geishas, etc)
- Analyze the messages that a Halloween costume can reveal harmful ideas beneath the playful surface.

The general rule of thumb is that if a costume is related to someone's identity or culture, then it is not something respectful to that person or culture because that is a part of someone's identity, part of who they are. "We are a culture, not a costume."

Halloween is an opportunity for us to reach a better understanding of the concepts of diversity, inclusion, and respect for each other as individuals and as a group.
